OVERVIEW OF IRCC PROGRAMS - TEMPORARY RESIDENCE

VISIT

Find out if you need a visa to visit, do business or transit through Canada, and how to extend your stay as a visitor

STUDY

Apply for or extend a study permit or student work permit

Get a study permit

Who can apply, how to submit your application, processing times and what to expect when you get to Canada.

You need these documents to apply for a study permit:

- Proof of acceptance
- Proof of Identity
- Proof of financial support

You may also need:

- A letter of explanation
- An attestation of issuance of your Quebec Acceptance Certificate (CAQ)
- A medical exam
- A custodian declaration (minors only), or
- Other documents

As of January 22, 2024, most students must include an <u>attestation letter</u> from the **province or territory** where they plan to study with their study permit application.

If you apply without an attestation letter your application will be returned unless you're either a

- minor child in a primary or secondary school (kindergarten to grade 12)
- student in a masters, PhD, or other post-graduate program
- student applying to extend your study permit.

Work while studying

Who can work while they study, how much and where (on campus, off campus, co-op, and post-graduation)

Study as a French-speaking student

To be eligible for the Francophone Minority Communities Student Pilot (FMCSP), you must meet the following criteria:

- be a citizen of an eligible country
- have a letter of acceptance from a <u>participating designated learning institution (DLI)</u> that says you're applying under the FMCSP
 - Your study program must meet the requirements of the pilot.
- have enough money to pay for
 - your tuition fees
 - living expenses for yourself and any family members who come with you to Canada
- live outside of Canada when you apply

- get a medical exam (if you need one)
- get a police certificate (if you need one)
- be able to prove that your French <u>speaking</u>, <u>listening</u>, <u>reading</u> and <u>writing skills</u> are at a level 5 or higher in the Niveaux de compétence linguistique canadiens (NCLC) scale.

As a participant in the pilot, you

- will have access to settlement services during your studies
- may be eligible for permanent residence soon after completing your studies.

Stay and work in Canada after you graduate

Get a work permit to stay in Canada after you graduate under certain conditions and how to apply for permanent residence.

WORK TEMPORARILY IN CANADA

Temporary workers

Work permits, labour market impact assessment and how your spouse can work in Canada.

Temporary Foreign Worker Program

Allows Canadian employers to hire foreign workers for temporary positions when they are unable to find qualified Canadian workers. A Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA) is required.

International Mobility Program

Allows the employer to hire a temporary worker without a Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA). This program has several streams including:

Mobilité francophone stream

Facilitated work permit:

- LMIA exemption for Canadian employers who hire French-speaking foreign workers:
- outside Quebec;
- no criteria based on age or nationality.

International Experience Canada (IEC)

International Experience Canada (IEC) provides youth aged 18 to 35 with the opportunity to travel and work in Canada. To participate:

- your country or territory of citizenship must have an agreement with Canada that allows you to apply for an IEC work permit or
- you may be able to use a recognized organization.

Depending on which country you're from, you can choose from up to 1, 2 or 3 pools of travel and work experiences:

- Working Holiday: open work permit. Fund your vacation with temporary work in Canada, for more than one employer, in more than one location.
- Young Professionals: employer-specific work permit. You need a job offer for a paid position.
 The job must contribute to your professional development.

o **International Coop (Internship)**: employer-specific work permit. A job offer for a work placement or internship is required. You must be a student registered in a postsecondary institution and need to do this work placement or internship to complete your studies.

Open work permit for the spouse or common-law partner or dependent child of a skilled worker

Open work permit for the spouse or common-law partner or dependant child of a temporary worker occupying a position for 6 months or more.

- 2-week processing for highly skilled workers

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE CANADA EXPÉRIENCE INTERNATIONALE CANADA

International Experience Canada (IEC) provides youth aged 18 to 35 the opportunity to travel and work in Canada with three different categories:

- **▶** Working Holiday
- **▶** Young Professionals
- ► International Co-op Internship

IEC is available in more than 30 countries that have bilateral Youth Mobility Agreements with Canada including **France**, **Portugal**, **Spain**, **Switzerland** as well as **Belgium** and **Luxembourg** for the **18-30 years old**.

Working Holiday

Enjoy the freedom of an open work permit. Work when you want and where you want!

Young Professionals

Develop your career by acquiring work experience in Canada.

Candidates must have a job offer for paid employment before applying to IEC.

International Co-op Internship


If you are a student, consider doing your internship (work placement) in Canada. Candidates must have an internship offer before applying to IEC. The internship must be required to complete their studies.

OVERVIEW OF IRCC PROGRAMS - PERMANENT RESIDENCE

IMMIGRATE TO CANADA

There are several programs to immigrate to Canada permanently, with or without a job offer. Use the **Come to Canada** tool to find out what immigration programs you can apply for **Express Entry**

The application process for skilled immigrants who want to settle in Canada permanently, outside Quebec, and take part in our economy.



Since May 2023, a new <u>Category-based rounds of invitations</u> allows Canada to issue invitations to apply to prospective permanent residents with specific skills, training or language ability.

Current category-based selection invitations will focus on candidates who have:

- French-language proficiency
- work experience in the following fields:
 - Healthcare occupations
 - o Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) occupations
 - Trade occupations
 - Transport occupations
 - o agriculture and agri-food occupations

Category-based rounds are in addition to general and program-specific rounds, such as those for the Provincial Nominee Program.

Provincial nominees

Immigrate by being nominated by a Canadian province or territory.

Atlantic Immigration Program

Immigrate by graduating from a school or working in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, or Newfoundland and Labrador

Rural and Northern Immigration Pilot

Smaller Canadian communities supporting their local economy through immigration.

Agri-Food Pilot

Immigrate by working in specific agri-food industries and occupations.

Start-up Visa

Immigrate by starting a business and creating jobs.

Self-employed

Immigrate as a self-employed person in cultural or athletic activities.

Quebec-selected skilled workers

Immigrate as a skilled worker in the province of Quebec.

Immigrate to a Francophone community outside Québec

Live, work or study in French in a Francophone community outside Quebec

Welcoming Francophone Communities initiative

Build your life in a Francophone community in Canada

Thanks to the renewal of the initiative and the addition of new communities, many French-speaking newcomers will continue to receive the support they need in various aspects of building their life in Canada.

PERMANENT RESIDENTS: GET HELP BEFORE ARRIVING IN CANADA – PRE-ARRIVAL SERVICES

You can get free in-person and online services, if:

- IRCC (Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada) approved your permanent residence application.
- You're currently outside Canada
- You have one of these documents:
 - o a letter from IRCC saying you can get pre-arrival services.
 - o a confirmation of permanent residence letter.
 - o a passport request letter that indicates permanent resident visa issuance.
 - o a letter from IRCC asking for your medical exam results.
 - o a single-entry permanent resident visa.
 - o a letter from IRCC letting you know you can pick up your permanent resident visa.

Free newcomer services: experienced settlement professionals can help you to:

- Look for a job
- Get a language assessment
- Register for language classes
- Find a place to live
- Sign up your kids for school
- Learn about community services

Pre-arrival services can help you to:

- prepare for your move to Canada.
- get your education, work experience and credentials recognized in Canada.
- · connect with employers to find a job.
- connect with free services after you arrive in Canada.

You can access all of the services that we fund for free.

Connexions Francophones

Connexions Francophones provides services in person in Morocco as well as online services on a global scale. If you wish to live in a francophone community in Canada, Connexions francophones can provide you with:

- Information and guidance
- Referral to local francophone organizations
- · Assessment of your needs
- Personalized settlement plan with other links to resources in Canada.

*Note: You **can't** get pre-arrival services if you're coming to Canada for a short time. For example, **temporary residents** visiting, studying or working in Canada on a visa or permit don't qualify for pre-arrival services.
